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Hereditary angioedema (HAE) is a rare, often inherited disease that can cause episodes of sudden, painful swelling. These swelling attacks commonly occur in the abdomen, hands, feet, genitals, or face, but can affect almost any part of the body.<sup>1,2</sup>

People typically do not suspect HAE because these symptoms can look like more common conditions. Sometimes it can take years to find the right diagnosis.<sup>1,3,4</sup>

If you see symptoms like these, it's time to connect the swells.
